DIGGING DEEPER

- 3) In 1 Samuel 5-6, the Philistines were eventually willing to *admit* that they were fighting against God - yet, they remained unwilling to *submit* to God themselves. Read the passages below about how Egypt responded to some of God’s miracles and plagues.

Exodus 7:2-5 - "[2] *You shall speak all that I command you. And Aaron your brother shall tell Pharaoh to send the children of Israel out of his land. [3] And I will harden Pharaoh's heart, and multiply My signs and My wonders in the land of Egypt. [4] But Pharaoh will not heed you, so that I may lay My hand on Egypt and bring My armies and My people, the children of Israel, out of the land of Egypt by great judgments. [5] And the Egyptians shall know that I am the LORD, when I stretch out My hand on Egypt and bring out the children of Israel from among them.*"

Exodus 8:15 - "But when Pharaoh saw that there was relief, he hardened his heart and did not heed them, as the LORD had said."

Exodus 8:19 - "Then the magicians said to Pharaoh, "This is the finger of God." But Pharaoh's heart grew hard, and he did not heed them, just as the LORD had said."

Exodus 8:31-32 - "[31] And the LORD did according to the word of Moses; He removed the swarms of flies from Pharaoh, from his servants, and from his people. Not one remained. [32] But Pharaoh hardened his heart at this time also; neither would he let the people go."

Why do you think Pharaoh repeatedly hardened his heart?

What do you think was God's purpose in sending the plagues to Egypt?

There are several possible answers for the last question, but what do you think God's purpose was regarding Exodus 7:5?

With this understanding, why do you think God allowed the Philistines to "capture" the ark of God and then greatly *suffer* because of it? What do you think was God's purpose?

4) Sin can sometimes be described as "fun" or "momentarily pleasing", yet people are often left with guilt, shame,

scars, and baggage. Why do you think God allows sin to come with so many bad side effects?
