1) This week we talked about Jesus bringing peace to us, by being born in the flesh. Read Jesus' words below.

Luke 19:41-42 - "[41] Now as He drew near, He saw the city and wept over it, [42] saying, "If you had known, even you, especially in this your day, the things that make for your peace! But now they are hidden from your eyes."

What do you think Jesus meant in this passage?

What does this passage teach you about God?

2) The following passage is a remarkable description of Jesus. What stands out to you from it?

Colossians 1:15-23 - "[15] He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. [16] For by Him all things were created that are in heaven and that are on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or principalities or powers. All things were created through Him and for Him. [17] And He is before all things, and in Him all things consist. [18] And He is the head of the body, the church, who is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in all things He may have the preeminence. [19] For it pleased the Father that in Him all the fullness should dwell, [20] and by Him to reconcile all things to Himself, by Him, whether things on earth or things in heaven, having made peace through the blood of His cross. [21] And you, who once were alienated and enemies in your mind by wicked works, yet now He has reconciled [22] in the body of His flesh through death, to

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present you holy, and blameless, and above reproach in His sight-- [23] if indeed you continue in the faith, grounded and steadfast, and are not moved away from the hope of the gospel which you heard, which was preached to every creature under heaven, of which I, Paul, became a minister."

What does this passage teach you about Jesus?

Does this passage make Jesus' incarnation (His being born as a baby) more incredible? Why or why not?

3) This week we learned that we are saved by simply believing in Jesus (by grace), but that genuine faith will result in works. How do the following passages help you understand the balance between grace and works?

James 2:14-17, 19, 26 - "[14] What does it profit, my brethren, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can faith save him? [15] If a brother or sister is naked and destitute of daily food, [16] and one of you says to them, "Depart in peace, be warmed and filled," but you do not give them the things which are needed for the body, what does it profit? [17] Thus also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead. ... [19] You believe that there is one God. You do well. Even the demons believe--and tremble! ... [26] For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also."

Ephesians 2:8-9 - "[8] For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God, [9] not of works, lest anyone should boast."

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
